For many young cancer patients, fertility is not something that you think about. However, it is important to speak to your doctor and find out whether your cancer treatment plan will affect your fertility and your ability to start a family in the future. <u>Males</u> and <u>females</u> may experience different issues as a result of their treatment and have different fertility preservation options. Consider speaking to a fertility specialist to understand your options.

SURVIVORSHIP

Being diagnosed with cancer at a young age means you have a long survivorship period during which you may continue to face health issues consequent to your cancer treatment. Adjusting to life after cancer can be difficult. It is important to discuss anxieties with your family and your cancer care team. Additionally:
